



A Note from Rabbi Michael Fessler

As this bulletin reaches you, Passover is around the corner. A fundamental cornerstone of Jewish memory, the holiday recalls our liberation from slavery at Pharaoh's hands. The Passover seder isn't just a memorial of that liberation: it's a reenactment. We're taught that the Exodus wasn't just an event in our past — in the words of the Haggadah, in every generation we are obligated to see ourselves as having gone out from Egypt, from *Mitzrayim*.

That leap of historical empathy may be easier this year. *Mitzrayim* comes from the Hebrew root *tzar*: narrowness, constriction. For many of us, the past two years of pandemic have evoked the experience of *Mitzrayim*, as we faced unfamiliar dangers, unexpected isolation, and social dislocation — and for too many of us, significant losses along the way.

As I write this, many signs are pointing toward a kind of liberation: coronavirus cases are plummeting thanks to vaccinations and acquired immunity, and we're looking forward to resuming in-person gatherings, marking milestones, and sharing space together with growing ease.

There's one particular lesson of the Exodus story that I hope we can apply to our current moment. While leaving Egypt, we're told in Deuteronomy 25, an enemy tribe, Amalek, "surprised you on the march, and struck at your rear, at all the weak ones who were behind you when you were famished and weary." Throughout Jewish history, we are told, we should remember Amalek: the villainous symbol of unwarranted, barbaric aggression against the vulnerable.

But a Hasidic commentary, *Itturei Torah*, notes that had the children of Israel not forgotten about the slower ones in back, the Amalekites would not have succeeded in their attack. "Because you allowed the slower ones to fall *acharecha*, you treated them as *acher*, "other," leaving them vulnerable to attack." Therefore, the Torah tells us to remember Amalek so that we never forget to bring our brothers and sisters who need special attention into our midst and protect them, rather than leaving them behind.

In the same way, as both our synagogue community and our larger society resume in-person gatherings in the knowledge that most of us are reasonably well protected from COVID-19, we need to be mindful not to leave behind those who remain vulnerable — particularly people who are at heightened risk due to health conditions, and families with young children who can't yet be vaccinated. By continuing to make our programs accessible and by calibrating our precautions to protect our whole community, not just to fit our individual comfort levels, we remember the lesson of Amalek: on our march to freedom, leave no one behind.



**A Note from Karen Jacobs,
Co-Chair of the TBE Education Committee**

Religious and Hebrew education has not slowed down in the face of the pandemic here at Temple Beth-El. Even with the multiple closures of the Temple, the students have continued learning via Zoom when needed. When confronted with these, less than ideal, circumstances, our fabulous teachers have managed to keep students engaged in imaginative ways. After being on Zoom all of last year and starting this year via Zoom, we returned to in-person classes just after the High Holidays. Unfortunately, with the rise of Covid cases due to Omicron, we returned to Zoom in December for the safety of our students and teachers. We, once again, resumed classroom learning in the middle of February while continuing to take precautions with masks, air purifiers and social distancing.

We have shortened our education time during the pandemic for a variety of reasons. In-person snacks cannot be offered, and we have had to cut out large group singing practice. While on Zoom, many of our traditional teaching methods had to be altered as the children have a shorter attention span when learning virtually. One positive development has been the addition of 20-30 minutes of individual, virtual tutoring for Ivrit students in grades 3-7. This has allowed us to focus on the needs of each student individually and it has been so beneficial that we are going to continue it when in-person learning is happening.

Outside of the classrooms, we have continued to run a Shalom Tots Friday night program once a month on Zoom as well as some very lovely joint family services with the Congregation Shir Chadash clergy and families. We look forward to hosting Jennifer Levine as Artist in Residence this May to work with the school. She will help us learn about *Hatikvah* and create a Prayer Mural on three panels that will be displayed at Temple Beth-El for years to come. This is being made possible by the Ma'alot Grant Program. Keep an eye on your email for future exciting events from our school.

**A Note From the Treasurer
Roger Lewin**

Hello fellow congregants,

As we start to think about our budget for the coming year, I wanted to give a quick update on the current year financial status. We have made much progress.

Our General Fund budget for the current year originally included a \$90k deficit. At the congregational meeting in November, we discussed that it would be closer to \$33k based on our loan forgiveness moving into this year, and personnel actions. Currently, I am projecting that the deficit will be closer to \$17k.

The response to the 5782 annual high holiday appeal was truly inspiring. This year, members of our congregation and employees of Temple Beth-El donated over \$77.5k, 25% higher than any previous year in at least 10 years. A huge thank you to everyone who donated, to Eric Goldstone and Joël Logan for all their work on the letters and tracking, and to Mark Cooper for his motivating appeal talk.

At the congregational meeting in May, a number of members suggested that we should contribute more to the Interfaith Council. Since then, members have made donations towards that organization and we have already contributed 4x the originally budgeted amount.

Our Lunchbox fund, not part of the General Fund, came into the year borrowing about \$1,900. With a great increase in need during the pandemic, the fund increased the monthly support from \$400 to \$500. Thanks to all the contributions, the fund now has a surplus to get through the year and a start into next year.

This year we also sold the parsonage at the prime time. Many thanks to John Weisman for all the work that went into making it happen. The net proceeds, about \$310k, went into the Building Fund. The first \$100k was used to pay off the loan the Building Fund had taken out (internally) several years ago. We also elected to move \$115k to the General Fund (not included in the deficit projections above).

Finally, don't forget about gift cards for groceries and so many other purchases at other stores, an easy way to help our congregation with little cost to you!

These are a few of our Passover things.


Matzah and karpas and chopped up haroset

These are a few of our Passover things


When the plagues strike

PASSOVER 2022 5782

On Passover, Jews are forbidden not only to eat *chametz* (leavened material), but also to possess it. This raises a question: what to do with it?

The most straightforward answer is to dispose of it, either by donating it to the needy, if it's unopened and edible, or by discarding or destroying it.

However, there is space in Jewish law to remove *chametz* from our possession on Passover without getting rid of it entirely. There is a "legal fiction" of selling all the chametz that does remain in our homes to a non-Jew who is not bound by the restrictions of Passover. While permissible, it is best used to avoid serious financial hardship or waste, particularly of items that can't be donated — not to avoid getting rid of those stale half-eaten bags of pretzels at the bottom of the pantry.

On behalf of Temple Beth-El, Rabbi Michael will be arranging for the sale of any *chametz* stored on the synagogue's property. If you would like to add your home's *chametz* to the sale, please follow these steps. The sale will be rescinded after the holiday's end.

Be sure to clean out all parts of the home you intend to use. (e.g., remove leavened products from kitchen and pantry; clean to remove food remnants from anyplace you bring food - cars, couches, and desks are perennial candidates.)

Isolate all the chametz that remains into a fixed, "sealed-off" space. For example, set it aside in a cupboard or closet, place a piece of tape over the door, and don't use it throughout the holiday. For refrigerated or frozen goods, you can double-bag items and tape them securely shut, then place the bag in the back of the fridge or freezer.

It is customary to make a contribution to the hungry as part of this sale. [I encourage everyone to make a donation to a local food bank, give to MAZON: A Jewish Response to Hunger \(www.mazon.org\)](#), or [donate to TBE](#) with the notation "Passover Appeal" to help us continue to feed the hungry at Dutchess Outreach every month.

Important note: The sale is executed on the morning of Friday, April 15 by 11:30 AM, and the chametz will revert to your possession at the end of Passover ([Saturday night, April 23 at 8:30 PM](#)). During that time, it's forbidden to touch or interact with the *chametz*.

There are many aspects to preparing for Pesach. Don't be overwhelmed – do what you can, and try something new. The act of selling is an easy way to enter into the liberating mood of the holiday. *Chag sameach v'kasher* (Have a happy and kosher Passover!),

CHOCOLATE MOUSSE TORTE FOR PASSOVER

Cake:

6 eggs, separated
1 ½ cups sugar, divided
2 sticks unsalted butter or margarine, softened
8 ounces semi-sweet chocolate, melted and cooled
½ cup ground almonds
¼ cup brandy, orange juice or raspberry syrup
1 tablespoon matzah cake meal

Meringue:

3 egg whites
¼ cup plus 1 tablespoon sugar
1 teaspoon potato starch
¼ cup water

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Grease a 9-inch springform pan and place a well-greased piece of wax paper on the bottom.

Beat egg whites until frothy. Slowly add ½ cup sugar, 2 tablespoons at a time, until the whites hold a good peak but are not dry. Set aside.

Beat egg yolks in a large mixer bowl until very thick and lemony in color, about 10-15 minutes. Add butter, 1 cup sugar, and melted chocolate. Beat 2 minutes.

Fold egg whites, ground nuts, flavoring, and cake meal into the remaining mixture. Remove 1 cup, refrigerate, and pour remainder into the pan. Bake for 45 minutes or until the cake begins to pull away from the sides.

Remove from the oven and cool for 15 minutes on a rack. Remove the sides of the pan. Let the torte cool completely before inverting onto a serving pan that can go into the oven. Remove the wax paper and spread the reserved cup of chocolate mixture evenly over the top. Refrigerate, covered, 6 to 8 hours or overnight.

Preheat oven to 350 degrees.



PASSOVER MANDEL BREAD

2 Cups Sugar	2-3/4 Cups Cake Meal
1/2 lb. Butter (softened)	1/2 tsp. Salt
6 Eggs	3/4 Cup Potato Starch
12 oz. Chocolate Chips	Cinnamon & Sugar mixture

Cream sugar & butter together. Add eggs, one at a time, beating after each. Sift cake meal, salt & potato starch and fold into egg mixture. Add chocolate chips. Mix well. Grease 2 cookie sheets (one loaf on each), loaf about 3" wide. Sprinkle cinnamon/sugar on top. Bake at 350 for 45 mins. until golden brown. Cool, slice & bake again on each side until golden. Optional: these can be chocolate dipped; ENJOY!

I, the undersigned, fully empower and permit Rabbi Michael Fessler to act in my place and stead, and on my behalf to sell all *chametz* possessed by me, knowingly or unknowingly, as defined by the Torah and Rabbinic Law (e.g. *chametz*, possible *chametz*, and all kind of *chametz* mixtures); also *chametz* that tends to harden and adhere to surfaces of pans, pots, or cooking utensils, the utensils themselves, as well as pet food that contains *chametz* and mixtures thereof.

Rabbi Michael Fessler is also empowered to lease all places wherein the *chametz* may be found, particularly at the address/es listed below, and elsewhere. Rabbi Michael Fessler has full right to appoint any agent or substitute in his stead and said substitute shall have full right to sell and lease as provided herein. Rabbi Michael Fessler also has the full power and right to act as he deems fit and proper in accordance with all the details of this Bill of Sale used in the transaction to sell all my *chametz*, *chametz* mixtures, etc., as provided herein. This power is in conformity with all Torah, Rabbinic and Civil laws.
